

# National Priorities Programme for Adult Social Care and Social Work (IPASC)



NIHR has funded 15 Applied Research Collaborations (ARCs) to support applied health and care research that responds to, and meets, the needs of local populations and local health and care systems.

#### **IPASC** aims and objectives

To support and stimulate the implementation of evidence-based (evaluated) service change at national and/or supra-regional level in adult social care

to identify social care activities and innovations that would benefit from (further) evaluation and support with (wider) implementation.

(Phase1)

❖ to explore the facilitators and barriers to improving the evidence base and implementation, by understanding how well innovative models of service delivery work, for whom, and under what circumstances. (Phase 2)

# Developing consensus about the Implementation Priorities for Adult Social Care and Social Work

- The core group of the 9 ARCs scoped regional implementation projects/opportunities in their networks and have discussed potential topic areas for the collaboration to take forward.
- The collaboration have identified a longlist of 10 topics, with the aim of selecting approx. 3 or 4 topic areas, which will be the initial focus areas for the national programme.

- To incorporate the views from policy makers/practitioners and public contributors, prioritisation of themes/projects consisted of consultation with:
  - policy makers/practitioners panel
  - public members panel

The professional stakeholders panel (N=13)	The public contributors panel (N=14)	Virtual prioritisation process	Feedback triangulation
Members were purposefully selected to include commissioners, providers, user organisations, research groups, and other representative bodies;	An 'Opportunity for Involvement' in the Research Prioritisation Panel was sent to PPI Leads from the 9 ARCs.	Priority/importance rating, based on two criteria:  *How far the social care activity within the topic area will be beneficial in achieving the goals of the care system  *How feasible it is to implement the activity more widely across the care system	Analysing and interpreting the quantitative data (ie raw voting scores)
Examples include DHSC, SCIE, ADASS, Carers UK, Royal College of Occupational Therapists or Research in Practice;	People who had an interest in the opportunity were required to send an Expression of Interest, and to complete a short application form to ensure diversity of backgrounds/experiences, aiming for a mix of service users and carers;	For each of the projects/topic areas, participants had to choose from the following options:  *low priority (being less beneficial and implementable)  *medium priority  *high priority (being more beneficial and implementable)	Analysing and interpreting the qualitative data that emerged from the actual discussions and other means of communication (i.e. the chat function on Zoom or other feedback trough emails).
